

Students with disabilities who spend more of their school day in inclusive settings earn higher scores on tests of language ability



Treating all students the same, which may not address diverse needs



Building an Inclusive Curriculum (1) What is an Inclusive Curriculum?

 A curriculum that represents diverse perspectives, voices, and experiences.

• For example: Including works from different cultural backgrounds in a literature course.

Inclusive Teaching Strategies (2)

Differentiated Instruction

- Tailor teaching methods to suit the needs of different learners.
- For example: Offer students a choice in how they present their understanding (essay, video, presentation).





- 2. Adaptive learning tools.





 - NVDA (screen reader)
 - Grammarly (writing support)
 - Kurzweil (reading support)




Inclusive Practices in Online



Addressing Implicit Bias in Teaching (1)

What is Implicit Bias?

- Unconscious attitudes or stereotypes that affect understanding and actions.
- Project Implicit supplies various online Implicit
 Association Tests (IAT) on possible topics which
 aim to measure attitudes and beliefs that people
 may be unable, unaware or unwilling to report.



- Seek diverse perspectives.





 - Create rules and expectations that account for diverse behaviors and needs.
 - For example: Use of positive behavior reinforcement.








